Tim White has enjoyed several careers: broadcasting, journalism, documentary film, the military, academia, public diplomacy, and business. Born in Michigan, he has degrees from Michigan State, University of Southern California, and a doctorate from the University of Maryland, where he is an Associate Professor in the Department of Communications. He is a member of The Spectrum Group, one of Washington's most respected consulting firms, and managing partner of Virginia Energy Exchange, an energy development company.

He began his broadcasting career in local radio at the age of 14. As a television reporter, anchor, and producer for NBC, Fox, ABC and PBS affiliates around the country, he won six Emmy awards. In 2005, he was inducted into the Radio and Television Broadcasters Hall of Fame. As a Foreign Service officer, he was appointed executive producer of documentaries for the State Department's US Information Agency. His film projects included assignments in Western Europe, Russia, New Guinea, India, Afghanistan, the Middle East, and Africa.

Tim served in the U.S. Air Force, active duty and Reserve, for over thirty years. His military service included duty in Panama, Bosnia, and Iraq. Holding senior leadership positions in strategic communications, public affairs, recruiting and international liaison, he retired with the rank of brigadier general.

Tim White is a trustee and executive committee member of the US Capitol Historical Society, board member of the Buffalo Bill Center of the West in Cody, Wyoming, and president of The Literary Society of Washington (founded in 1874). His daughter Elizabeth, 27, is an executive with a major firm in Michigan. Tim has homes in Arlington, Virginia and Cody, Wyoming.
